The Longest Night

While Advent is a season of hope and Christmas is a season of joy, not everyone feels hopeful or like celebrating. Grief, illness, aging, depression, loneliness, unemployment, and loss are magnified. Even those who are not struggling with losses may feel the stress of preparations and expectations around Christmas time.

A Longest Night service provides a time and place of solace where we can come together seeking healing and room to share grief, sadness, loneliness, or confusion when these emotions often feel out of place during the holidays.

In the Northern Hemisphere, Dec 21 is the longest night, the winter solstice. It marks the shortest day of the year, the official start of winter. Tradition says that nature and all her creatures stop and hold their breath to see if the sun will turn back from its wanderings, if the days will lengthen and the earth will once again feel the sun's warmth. On this darkest day of the year, we come with our honest yearnings seeking the return of light and hope.

¹Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. ²⁵To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One. ²⁶Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing. ²⁷Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the LORD, and my right is disregarded by my God"?

Lighting of the Advent Wreath

First Candle: Promise and Redemption

Faithful God, you are the source of all mercy and consolation. With this candle, we remember the hope that you kindle among us through Jesus Christ, the light of the world. We remember your promise of redemption. Sustain us by your assurance that the light shines in the darkness and the darkness will not overcome it.

The first candle is lit. Silence for reflection.

God of promise and redemption,
you are our light and our salvation, our refuge and our stronghold.

Second Candle: Acceptance and Mercy

Merciful God, your light shines even in our darkest hours, and your love neither fails nor forsakes us. With this candle, we acknowledge the fear and sadness that grips our lives. We remember our struggles with painful emotions, difficult thoughts, and unfulfilled desires. We bring to you our loneliness, despair, doubt, anxiety, anger, disappointment, and our yearnings. Grant us your peace that surpasses all human understanding.

The second candle is lit. Silence for reflection.

God of acceptance and mercy,
you are our light and our salvation, our refuge and our stronghold.

Third Candle: Memory and Hope

Almighty God, you turn the shadow of death into daybreak. With this candle, we remember those whose absence still fills our hearts with sorrow and leaves holes in our lives. We cherish their memories and

commend them into your unfailing light. Surround them with your eternal love, and grant us your peace.

The third candle is lit. Silence for reflection.

God of memory and hope,
you are our light and our salvation, our refuge and our stronghold.

Fourth Candle: Comfort and Grace

Compassionate God, your steadfast love accompanies us, and your light shines on the broken places in our lives. With this candle, we acknowledge our unspoken pains and hidden griefs. Bind up our wounded hearts and soothe our troubled spirits. Give us strength and comfort through your promise to make us whole.

The fourth candle is lit. Silence for reflection.

God of comfort and grace,
you are our light and our salvation, our refuge and our stronghold.

Lighting of Individual Candles and Healing Rite

All are invited to light a candle and place it in the sand bowl. The candle can represent a special prayer or someone you are holding in prayer. It can also represent something that's been on your mind that you want to entrust to God's care.

Please light your candle as you feel moved to do so. Those who wish to receive a healing blessing may then proceed to the back of the sanctuary to be anointed with oil and prayed for individually.

Closing Prayer

O Lord our God, you see and know and feel the suffering and pain of the world. Look upon us when we feel alone, and enfold us with your love,

that in the midst of our pain, our loneliness, our worry and our concern we may know your presence. We ask this blessing in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
