Ash Wednesday

On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

Imposition of Ashes
Making the sign of the cross with ashes upon the forehead is an ancient tradition of the Church. It is derived from the practice of penitents throwing ashes over their heads when they had finished their confession and prayers. The imposition of ashes is a voluntary act of Christian devotion; neither an act of pride nor shame, but meant to be an aid in "returning to God."
Those who desire to receive ashes in the spirit of humility and repentance may come forward at this time. If you desire to have ashes placed on your hand instead of your forehead, please extend your hand as you approach the pastor. May

this spiritual experience be one of renewal, cleansing, and closeness with God.
