

First Sunday in the Season of Creation: "Forest Sunday"

In Acts 10:39, Paul's sermon reminds us that "They put [Jesus] to death by hanging him on a tree." Trees have a central place in the stories of God's Creation and God's salvation. John 3:16 tells us 'For God so loved the world ...' On this first Sunday in the Season of Creation, this verse reminds us that God's act of salvation was motivated by love for the entire world—"cosmos" in Greek—not just for humanity. Forests are an integral and indispensable part of Creation.
