A Baptist minister, Martin Luther King Jr. led the African American civil rights movement out of his passion for the poor and the disenfranchised, his dedication to nonviolence, and his devotion to Jesus. He modeled Christian nonviolent disobedience to unjust laws. His contributions to American society were recognized when in 1986 his birthday, January 15, was designated a federal holiday, now celebrated on the third Monday in January. An alternate date for his commemoration is his death day, April 4.

Forgiveness is not an occasional act; it is a constant attitude.

Returning hate for hate multiplies hate, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that. Hate multiplies hate, violence multiplies violence, and toughness multiplies toughness in a descending spiral of destruction. So, when Jesus says, "Love your enemies," he is setting forth a profound and ultimately inescapable admonition. Have we not come to such an impasse in the modern world that we must love our enemies- or else? The chain reaction of evil-hate begetting hate, wars producing wars-must be broken, or we shall be plunged into the dark abyss of annihilation.

We must develop and maintain the capacity to forgive. The one who is devoid of the power to forgive is devoid of the power to love. There is some good in the worst of us and some evil in the best of us. When we discover this, we are less prone to hate our enemies.


