Like living stones let yourselves be built into a spiritual house vibrant with life, in which you serve as a holy priesthood offering Christ-inspired lives up to God.

- 1 Peter 2 (NRSVUE/MSG Translation)

Grace and peace be with you!

It continues to be a joy, privilege, and meaningful calling to walk with you all as pastor at the “spiritual house” of Good Soil. And, as 1 Peter 2 describes, it is certainly vibrant with life! The reports throughout these pages are a testament to what the Holy Spirit is doing and continues to do in and among us in the midst of this faith community.

Last year, we celebrated becoming an RIC ([Reconciling in Christ](#)) congregation. About 12% of congregations in the ELCA are RIC—designated safe and affirming churches for LGBTQ+ people and people of color. This initiative supports our ministry priority “Creating a culture of invitation and enthusiastic welcome, especially for those for whom the church has not always been a welcoming place,” and it blossomed out of the congregation’s focus groups during our Dandelion Project Strategic planning process from 2022-2023. We have welcomed several new faces and families to Good Soil who were searching for affirming communities, or chose Good Soil as their new home because this is such a central value of this congregation.

Another exciting development has been the progress in calling a shared Minister of Christian Formation (ELCA pastor or deacon) with our siblings in Christ at Bethesda on the Bay Lutheran.

This Rostered Minister will work in partnership with the lead pastors, staff, and congregations to deepen and grow ministry, especially within the area of Christian Formation. Worship, Sunday School, confirmation, Bible studies, small groups, communion classes, service and learning opportunities, and spiritual practices are all examples of how we are “formed” in the Christian faith and life. The Deacon or Pastor will be a full partner in this new collaboration—leading in the areas of Christian Formation while also sharing in the full range of pastoral duties, based on their unique gifts and talents, as appropriate. We thank the joint call committee for their countless hours of work, preparation, and prayer that have fueled this process. Please continue to pray for them, for our congregational partnership, and for the person whom God will call to this position.

Additional highlights from this past year:

1) Good Soil was selected as a recipient of a national Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Grant! Read the press release [here](#). My sabbatical will take place in Summer of 2027. See the Renewal Planning Team report for more info.

2) Good Soil received national recognition when we were featured as a part of Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton’s final Synod Assembly churchwide video address entitled, “[Our Journey of Faith Together](#).” We were blessed with Bishop Eaton’s preaching and worship leadership with us as a part of that filming weekend.

In terms of the pastoral office, from June 2, 2025 through May 31, 2026, I've presided over 4 baptisms, 3 confirmations, 2 funerals/graveside services, and 2 pet blessings. For continuing education, I attended a 1-day course, "Boosting Productivity: Time Management Tactics for Working Smarter" through the Institute for Management Studies. I continue to offer pastoral care and visits with members who are homebound, hospitalized, in rehab, or in hospice, and I share my gifts with the wider church by serving on the synod's consultation committee.

Thank you to Pastor Jim for serving as the Pastor of Presence, to Good Soil's staff, council leadership, and volunteers for all you did to keep ministry rolling, and to our faith community as a whole for the prayers, support, and gift of parental leave at the beginning of our son's life. We are so glad to be church family with you, and it was a blessing to celebrate Miles' baptism with you all too!

Communications & Community Life Coordinator Report 2026

As the Communications and Community Life Coordinator, I develop visual and practical aspects of worship and culture at Good Soil to help create a welcoming, accessible environment.

-I prepare worship materials, both digital and physical, such as the bulletin, children's bulletin, worship slides, announcement slides, the leader guides used both by Pastor Marissa and readers during worship, and more as the need arises.

-I manage Good Soil's online presence, running social media pages, editing YouTube videos, and assembling and sending the Seeds e-news. I also handle tech support when it comes to the usage of social media, especially in regards to the comments section on our Facebook livestreams. I also help to maintain a digital archive of photos taken at events at and around Good Soil.

-I design promotional materials, such as fliers and leaflets, to help spread the word about events at Good Soil. I also develop polls and surveys as needed.

-I organize and maintain the bulletin boards, ensuring that all postings are current and relevant.

-I order the flowers that adorn the sanctuary both on a weekly basis and for special occasions, such as Christmas and Easter. For those special occasions, I develop and maintain a running order list as submitted through physical forms stuffed in the bulletins and online forms. I also maintain the flower order sign up list. This year, I also handled the transition to a new florist, Cottage of Flowers, as our former florist, Al Wilhelmy, closed permanently.

-I update Good Soil's membership book as needed, and I process visitor connection cards so that all guests at Good Soil feel welcomed. I also maintain a list of birthdays, baptism anniversaries, and wedding anniversaries.

-I send both quarterly and weekly mailings to Good Soil's homebound members.

-I connect with the weekly online usher to ensure that they have the announcements and sermon reflection question. I also reach out to the supply pastor when Pr. Marissa will be absent to make sure they have the information they need in regards to the bulletin. Additionally, I reach out to other worship servants when there are changes in the service and liturgical music.

-I help tidy the sanctuary, especially in preparation for large events, such as Easter worship.

-I help keep the prayer list up to date, and connect with the prayer team to add or remove names. I also refresh the paper prayer list on the podium every week.

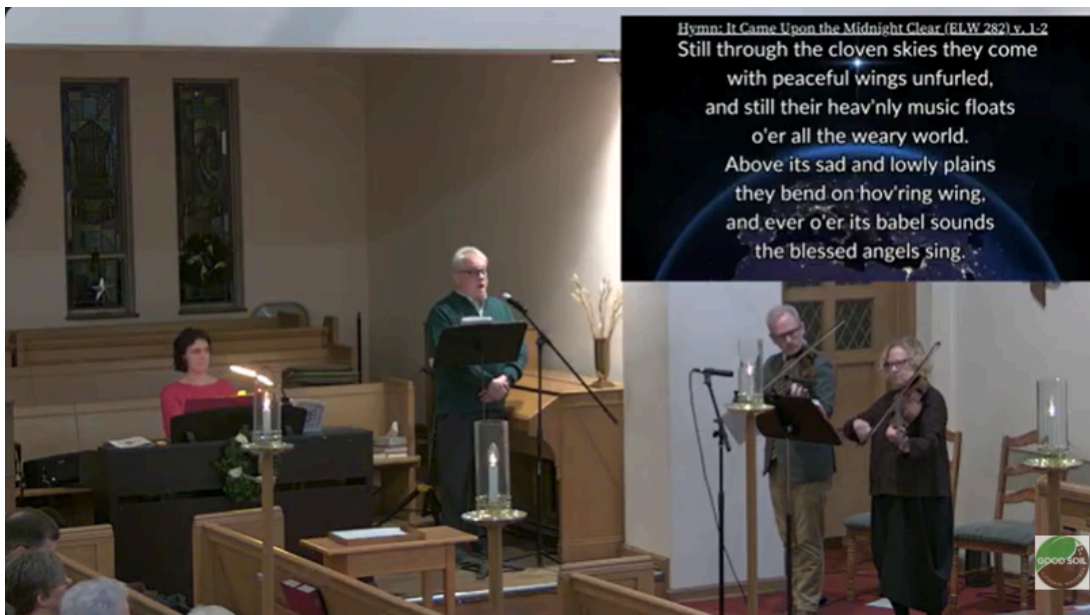
Worship and Music Coordinator's Report 2026

The team presented the new welcome statement at the 2024-25 annual meeting, and it was voted on and approved. At the same time, the congregation approved Good Soil becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation.

Fall 2025 Generosity Emphasis: "Growing in Grace and Generosity."

The theme this past year centered on Growing in Grace and Generosity, based on the scripture 1 Corinthians 3:6-8: "Paul planted, Apollos watered, God gave the growth . . . working together, you are God's field" which was proposed to engage the congregation to grow in different ways of support.

The campaign emphasizes that "growing in generosity" can take many forms, including maintaining giving during life transitions or doubling an offering for a specific month.

We received 36 submitted pledge cards for the pledges totaling \$82,398. Also, there remain additional members and supporters who share their gifts without making a statement of intent.

The Generosity Team is exploring new ways to honor those who make planned estate gifts and is working with Thrivent Financial to provide education on overall legacy giving. Thrivent representatives visited on Sunday, November 2nd to share a short presentation and provided three handouts: Giving Options, Tax Impacts of the Big Beautiful Bill, and Qualified Charitable Contributions.

Giving and generosity fuel our mission and ministries for all that is outlined in this annual report. The spirit of generosity continues to grow here at Good Soil and we thank God for you.

The Fall 2025 – Spring 2026 school year was a meaningful season of learning and growth for both our Sunday School program and the children we serve. We were especially grateful to welcome several new families and friends into our community throughout the year, enriching our program and deepening connections.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to exploring thoughtful and engaging ways to nurture our children's faith. We warmly invite your ideas and input as we continue to grow. We also welcome others to join the team (and the fun!). Please feel free to share suggestions with Chris Jacobson, Louise DeBell, Mandy Forshey, Sarah Sburlea, or JoAnne Wancata. We are also excited about the potential of a shared faith formation staff partnership and the opportunities it may bring to expand and enrich our children's learning experiences.

Opportunities During Worship: The Playground

The Playground offers a meaningful, hands-on worship experience designed especially for children. Located within the sanctuary, it provides a welcoming space where children can engage in worship in ways that are natural to them. The materials and setup encourage relationship-building within our church family while helping children learn about God's love. Older children are invited to participate in familiar elements of the service, such as the Lord's Prayer and hymns, alongside their families. Chris Jacobson faithfully maintains the Playground and prepares weekly materials, including Bible story coloring pages that align with the readings and sermon.

Learn and Grow Time (for our youngest learners)

Children in Elementary school and younger are invited to leave the sanctuary following the Children's Sermon for 15–20 minutes of age-appropriate activities before returning for a final prayer. During this time, children engage in crafts, simple Bible stories, songs, games, and coloring activities. They return to the sanctuary during the Passing of the Peace or Offering. We are grateful to Louise DeBell, Mandy Forshey, Sarah Sburlea, and Stormy Younger, who rotate as weekly leaders. As we conclude Spring 2026, we are reflecting on what we've learned and considering thoughtful adjustments for Fall 2026.

Children's Bulletins

Children's bulletins are available on the Welcome Table for both readers and pre-readers to use during worship or at home. These resources provide additional stories and activities designed to engage children more deeply and support their understanding of the service.

Hard to believe it's been 5 years since we installed our new setup. Time flies when you're having fun! A quick reminder of how far we've come:

•Since 2021, we've added two cameras, all new speakers with a new amplifier and audio mixer, two new microphones, a computer, two monitors, a video mixer, keypad and joystick to control the cameras, a portable cart to hold it all, not to mention all the software it takes to run our livestream each morning. Plus, new personal hearing devices for attendees.

•This past year, we added a second lavalier microphone (a small clip-on mic for hands free use, just like the one Pastor uses every Sunday). This allows for two worship leaders to be mic'd up while keeping their hands free. We continue to tweak and update our software as new versions come out, helping us improve quality and keep things running reliably week to week.

•Reminder – we have hearing devices available for use when attending the service in person. If you have issues hearing the service clearly in person, feel free to grab a hearing device from an usher on your way in.

•CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS! With the addition of the adorable Miles to our congregation (who, as it turns out, requires Trey's attention on Sundays!), Trey's had to step back a bit. We'd love to fill that gap and build a little extra cushion in the rotation. The setup can look a little intimidating at first, but it's very learnable—we'll walk you through it, and you'll get the hang of it quicker than you think. We promise! 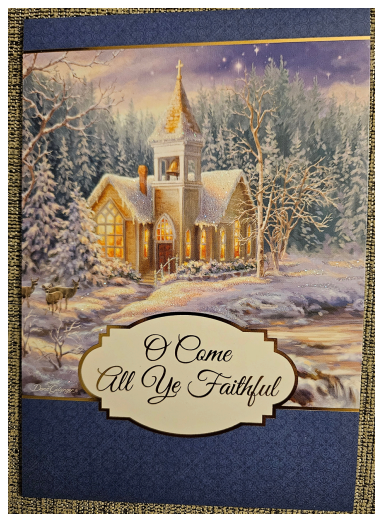
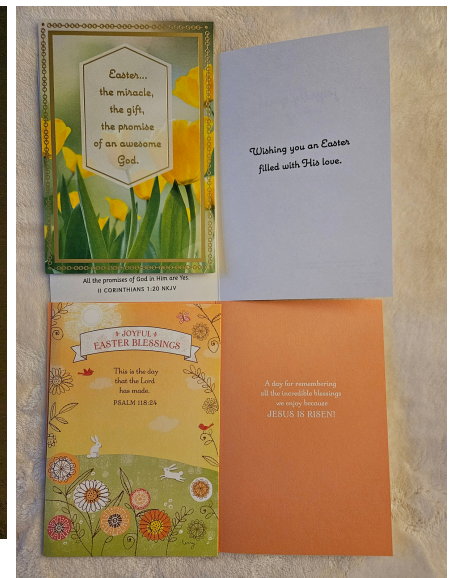
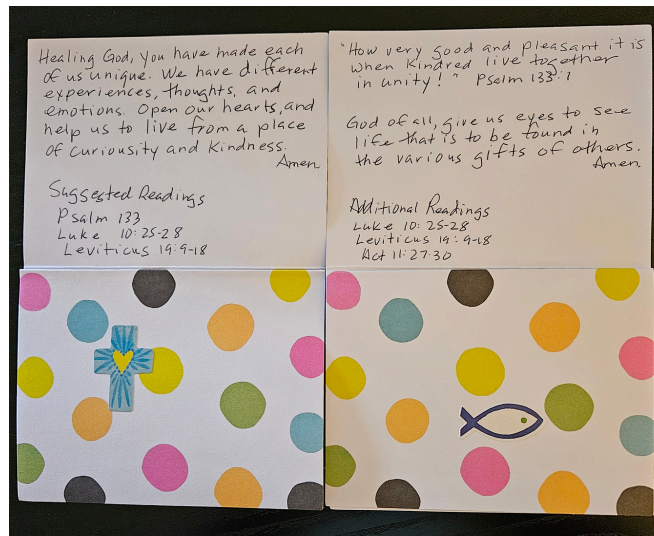
Card Ministry

The property committee is involved with various matters involving the church building and grounds.

Lawn Care: The company which has handled the mowing of the church lawn for several years re-organized recently. As a result, a new firm, Eclipse Outside Maintenance is handling the mowing and related work during 2026.

Snow Removal: The above re-organization also affected snow removal. Although the company name changed to Paramount Excavating, the ownership remains the same as prior years and will handle this for the winter of 2026-27.

The church owned four communion kits, and another four were purchased to ensure enough kits are available for visits.

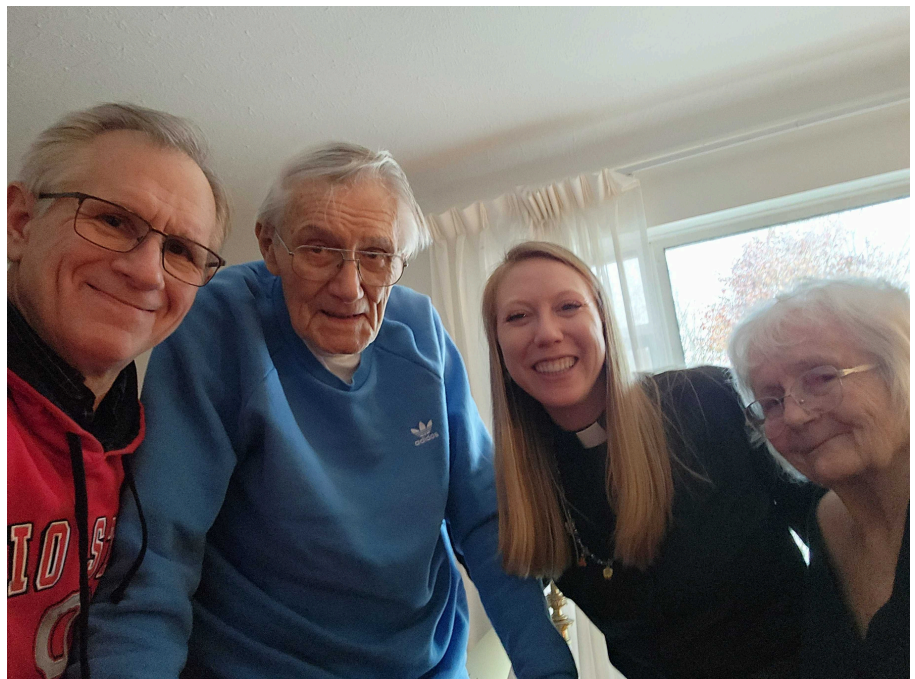
After an initial training by Pastor Marissa, the team members made their first visits in September 2025. Visits take place on the first Sunday of each month, or as close as possible to that Sunday.

Call Committee Report 2026

Minister of Christian Formation

Last year, Good Soil's Church Council voted to form a joint Call Committee with the congregation of Bethesda on the Bay in Bay Village to call a rostered candidate to fill the newly envisioned role of Minister of Christian Formation.

What is Christian Formation?

Sunday School, Confirmation, Bible Studies, Small Group ministry, Service and Learning opportunities, Acolyte and Communion Instruction Classes, and Worship, are all examples of how we are "formed" in the Christian faith and life.

How did this come about?

Both churches had recently participated in the Dandelion Project where each created a new Purpose Statement and a list of Guiding Principles that are very similar to each other. Both congregations have also observed: 1) Changing worship and learning practices for families due to busy schedules and competing activities on Sundays. 2) Children needing a better background and understanding of faith and of their own place as members of the faith family. 3) Adults of all ages and life stages requesting opportunities to nurture and grow their faith with bible studies, classes, forums and outreach.

The decisions of our respective Church Councils to move forward and call a joint Minister of Christian Formation were supported by the Dandelion Project initiatives; the fairly recent Calls for Pastors Angela and Marissa; and additional focus groups and visioning initiatives both congregations have undertaken.

This "joint" call is an exciting new option for shared ministry. Because it combines the unique aspects of each congregation with our shared vision for the Minister of Christian Formation, it has required additional reflection and discussion by the Committee over the past year – and new, unique questions for the Synod Office which is charting new waters as it supports our work.

The Role: Minister of Christian Formation

This person will be a Rostered Leader (a Deacon or Associate Pastor), hold a Masters of Divinity (or equivalent requirement of Rostered Clergy) and be ordained in the ELCA. The Minister of Christian Formation will partner with both congregations in a new vision and mission for sharing Faith Formation. Specific areas of focus include Congregational Life & Worship; Youth, Young Adult and Family Ministries and Outreach. In addition, as a member of a new collaborative ministry team, they will share pastoral duties as appropriate. Examples include, preaching, teaching, visitation, and pastoral care.

Committee Activity

In June 2025, a Call Committee consisting of members of both congregations was installed during services at both churches. Chris Webner (Bethesda) and JoAnne Wancata (Good Soil) are co-leaders.

Good Soil Members Amelia Forshey, Evan Paine, and Emma Sleva are serving on the Committee.

Pastor Mitch Phillips is our assigned Synod Coordinator for this Call.

In July 2025 we began meeting in person both as a full committee and also within our congregational sub-teams once or twice a month (with somewhat of a break for the holidays). We also connected between meetings via shared email rounds of review and discussion.

Chris and JoAnne also met frequently with each other and sometimes included Pastor Mitch and/or our church pastors to discuss progress and options, and to prepare and plan.

Ministry Site Profile

The most important task for our Call Committee has been to create and complete a comprehensive Ministry Site Profile (MSP) - the document describing a congregation's unique programs, personality, culture and needs. The Synod Office posts the MSP on its website to advertise our open position to potential candidates.

Good Soil and Bethesda on the Bay each created its own MSP to assist potential candidates in their review of this unique opportunity to support two congregations in a common vision. We also collaborated on specific content about the position that is identical in both MSPs. We shared drafts of the congregation MSP documents with each other and both Pastors for review and suggested edits. All committee members from each church are familiar with the documents representing both churches.

The Executive teams from both churches have met together to determine the financial details of the call. And, we've identified and confirmed a slate of References for our congregations and the Call who will take calls from potential candidates. Final drafts of both MSPs were shared in early May 2026 with Pastor Mitch/ the Synod office for final review and approval and posted on the ELCA mobility database website upon approval. (This report was written as these final steps were taking place)

Exciting times ahead!!

We're eager to see candidates' reactions to this posting and anticipate starting interviews this summer.

Renewal Planning Team Report 2026

Greetings from the Renewal Planning Team!

With joy and excitement, we're delighted to share that Good Soil was selected as a recipient of one of the national Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Grants! This is a very competitive grant with many churches that applied. Read the press release from the Clergy Renewal Program website [here](#). This national grant will provide funds to cover renewal activities for Pastor Marissa and renewal activities for the congregation. It will also cover funding for the Pastor of Presence and supply preachers during that time.

Originally scheduled for Summer 2026, with the birth of Miles Harrison, the Renewal Planning Team and council decided to postpone Pastor Marissa's sabbatical to Summer 2027. This time will be centered around renewal and intentional Congregation activities to foster community, rest, and spiritual growth.

Read below for the Renewal Leave/Sabbatical FAQ:

Q: How long will Pastor Marissa be gone?

A: Four months (16 weeks) during Summer 2027.

Q: How will worship happen while Pastor Marissa is away?

A: We will have a rotation of supply pastors to lead worship, and we will aim to feature different preaching voices throughout those four months.

Q: How will the business of the church be handled? (council, supervision of staff, interfacing with rental partners/tenants, etc.)

A: Staff members will continue in their normal duties. We will also have a "pastor of presence" – filling in for the duties of the office of pastor and partnering with council for leadership decisions. We'll also need additional volunteers to assist with office duties and other needs as they come up.

Q: How does this align with what is done elsewhere?

A: Sabbaticals are a common practice across the church for the health of congregations and their pastors. They are an opportunity for growth (and rest) for both the pastor and congregation so they can continue to strengthen their ministry together moving into the future. Sabbaticals are included in the synod's guidelines for compensation, and sabbatical leave is in the terms of Good Soil's call to Pastor in her letter of call from 2020. The council has been in unanimous support of a sabbatical for Pastor Marissa since discussions began in Spring of 2024.

Q: How can I learn more?

A: Read the book *Planning Sabbaticals* by Robert Saler along with the Renewal Team. Or, you can reach out to Pastor Mitch Phillips, Assistant to the Bishop for Leadership for the Northeastern Ohio Synod. He offered an information session on sabbaticals after worship on Sunday, May 4th, 2025. You can contact him at mphillips@neos-elca.org.

Q: How can I get involved?

A: If you would like to see certain events, please reach out to the planning team (below) and get involved. We need people to step up and be a part of planning this meaningful experience for the congregation together (fellowship, opportunities, studies, small groups, meals, opportunities for learning how to rest, etc.). A big thank you to those who have already provided leadership for some of these activities, including knitting group, book studies, and an upcoming church potluck.

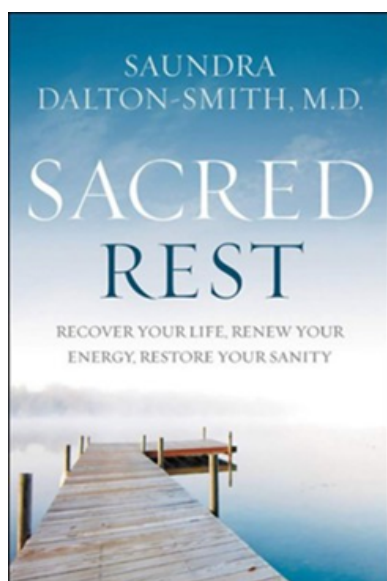

Treasurer's Report 2026

This year, several smaller accounts were streamlined into a First Federal money market account for ease of access. The total assets listed below do not include property assets. The Misc. Other Funds include \$60,000 set aside to fund the call of our joint rostered minister with Bethesda on the Bay Lutheran Church.

As we came to the end of 2025 the church's contributions were lower than budget. Other income sources were lower than budget due to lower building rents. In 2025, investment income was also lower than forecast. Most of our expenses were in line with expectations for 2025. As a result of the lower incomes, we finished 2025 with a deficit.

Through the first few months of 2026 our contributions are lower than budget but often churches and non-profits see seasonality with more giving coming later in the last 2-3 months of the year. Our expenses have mainly been in line with expectations. We have not experienced anything deviating significantly from our plan and we remain in a strong financial position as an excerpt from our balance sheet shows below.
